We are proud to share some of the significant milestones we have reached over the past year.

## **Enhancing Our Digital Presence**

This season, we placed a strong emphasis on increasing our visibility through social media. By partnering with Gerson Photography, we developed a comprehensive social media strategy that included engaging and original content across various platforms such as Instagram, Facebook, and TikTok. Our goal was to attract new followers and engage more members in the sport, and we are pleased to report that these efforts have yielded a notable increase in our online engagement.

# **Strategic Partnerships**

We have successfully forged several key partnerships that will enhance our programs and events.



### **Jolyn Canada**

OAS has entered into a three-year partnership with Jolyn Canada, an organization who aligns with our values and our vision for the future. Jolyn will become the official sponsor of Team Ontario, providing our athletes with custom JolynXOAS apparel. This partnership has also led to the rebranding of the Hilton Invitational to the Jolyn Invitational, an exciting new event scheduled to debut in April 2025.

### **Gervais Party & Tent Rentals**

Another critical partnership was established with Gervais Party & Tent Rentals. This four-year agreement ensures preferred pricing to all OAS Clubs on event staging equipment in addition to guaranteed rentals for multiple OAS events hosted at the Markham Pan Am Centre (MPAC). This partnership is expected to significantly enhance the quality of our events while providing cost-effective solutions.

# **Multi-Year Hosting Agreements**

OAS secured a four-year multi-event hosting agreement with the Markham Pan Am Centre (MPAC), which includes hosting the Leslie Taylor Meet, Jolyn Invitational and the Ontario Championships through 2028. This long-term commitment will provide us with a stable and prestigious venue for our major events, enhancing our negotiating position for associated services such as hotels and catering, and allowing us to release event schedules well in advance.

# **CAS Community Sport for All Grant Funding Initiative**

Inclusivity and accessibility have always been at the heart of OAS, and this season, we took significant steps forward. Through the CAS Community Sport for All initiative, we provided funding that enabled our Clubs to run AquaGo sessions, breaking down barriers and welcoming underrepresented groups into our community. The overwhelmingly positive feedback we've received is a testament to the power of sport to bring people together, and we are excited to see these initiatives continue to flourish

# **Club Engagement Initiatives**

In our ongoing commitment to increase Club engagement, OAS held three roundtable sessions to discuss potential changes for the 2024-2025 season. These sessions saw participation from all OAS Clubs and were instrumental in gathering feedback that shaped our strategic direction. The insights gained from these discussions were critical in the development of the OAS Strategic Plan for 2024-2028.



### **ATHLETES BY AGE**





# FINANCIAL REPORT

Ontario Artistic Swimming is pleased to present the annual financial report for the 2023-2024 season. This year has been one of strategic growth and operational efficiency, enabling OAS to solidify its position as a leader in the artistic swimming community. This report highlights the financial health of the organization, key achievements, and our forward-looking strategies that will ensure continued success.

### **Financial Overview**

In The fiscal year ending March 31, 2024, has been marked by prudent financial management, resulting in a stable financial position for OAS. We focused on optimizing our operations, reducing overhead costs, and securing long-term partnerships that align with our mission. Here are the key financial highlights:

### **Revenue & Funding**

Total revenue for the year amounted to \$1,346,492 which includes significant contributions from grants (\$221,451), membership fees (\$114,896), meet entry and course fees (\$430,902), and high-performance programs (\$511,243).

The CAS Community Sport for All Grant Funding supported our AquaGO! 2 sessions, aimed at increasing sport participation among underrepresented groups. Seven OAS clubs successfully ran these sessions within the 2023-2024 season.

### **Expenditures**

Our operating expenses for the year totaled \$1,277,348, reflecting our investment in key areas including programing costs and Personnel. Despite these necessary expenditures, we maintained tight control over costs to ensure financial stability.

### **Cost Management**

A significant milestone was the relocation of the OAS office, which resulted in substantial cost savings. By subletting the previous office space and moving to Dymon Storage in Etobicoke, we are now saving approximately \$2,243.54 per month.

This decision not only reduces our monthly expenses but also provides us with enhanced facilities and services at a fraction of the cost.

### Surplus/Deficit

For the 2023-2024 season, OAS experienced a net surplus of \$69,144 primarily due to increases in meet entry fees and overhead cost savings. Our unrestricted net assets remain steady at \$130,000 ensuring a solid foundation for future growth.

In addition to our financial stability, OAS has accomplished several key milestones that will have a lasting impact on our community:



### **Multi-Year Event Host Deal with MPAC**

OAS entered into a four-year hosting agreement with MPAC, securing dates for the Leslie Taylor, Hilton/Jolyn Invitational and the Ontario Championships. This partnership not only guarantees high-quality facilities for our events but also strengthens our negotiating position with service providers, leading to better terms and conditions for our members.

### **Community Engagements**

The AquaGO! 2 sessions, funded by the CAS Community Sport for All Grant, have been instrumental in breaking down barriers and increasing participation among Black, Indigenous, 2SLGBTQI+, and newcomer populations. The feedback from these sessions has been overwhelmingly positive, reflecting our commitment to inclusivity and diversity in artistic swimming.

### Office Relocation

The successful relocation to Dymon Storage has provided OAS with modern amenities and enhanced operational capabilities. The new space offers flexibility and cost savings, allowing us to reinvest in our core programs and services.

### **OAS Club Roundtable Sessions**

We held two successful roundtable sessions with all OAS clubs, fostering open dialogue and collaboration. The feedback from these sessions helped guide and shape our strategies for the 2024-2025 season.

As we move forward, OAS remains committed to fostering a vibrant, inclusive, and sustainable artistic swimming community in Ontario. Our financial health provides a strong foundation for future growth, and our strategic partnerships and programs will continue to drive our mission forward.

In closing, we would like to extend our sincere thanks to all our members, partners, and volunteers for their unwavering support and dedication. Together, we have built a resilient community that will remain strong going into the 2024-2025 season.





# **HUMAN RESOURCES REPORT**

The Mandate of the Human Resource Committee is to assist the Board in fulfilling its obligations relating to human resource matters through the review and recommendation of sound compensation, making recommendations regarding HR policies and practices that reflect legislative requirements and best practices, and helping to maintain a healthy workplace culture within the Ontario Artistic Swimming (OAS) organization.

This year marked the first full season under the leadership of our new Executive Director, Melissa Wolk. Melissa has brought a sense of stability and strong direction to our organization. Her dedication to learning our sport and her fresh perspective have been instrumental in guiding us forward. She continues to focus on strengthening our initiatives, working to position Ontario as the most diverse and resilient province.

Our full-time staffing complement remained consistent throughout the 2023-2024 season with Laura Steacy as the Technical Director, Lauren Lindner as the Events & Marketing Specialist and Officials Liaison, and Sue Marnica-Wall as the Administrator - Membership and Office Services.

We also maintained our collaboration with Mary-Jane Ling, who continued in her role as a full-time contractor as the Sport Development Specialist. We were pleased to welcome Yingli Hou as the Head High Performance Provincial Coach in September 2024. Yingli's mission is to lead the implementation of our high-performance athlete programming within the HP Academy and Team Ontario programs, while also shaping the strategic direction of athlete development across the province. Yingli, in partnership with Courtney Durand, who joined us in February 2024 as the 2025 Canada Games Team Manager and Assistant Coach, will work together to prepare Team Ontario for the 2025 Canada Summer Games in Newfoundland.

We were also fortunate to be able to use the Canada Artistic Swimming Community Sport for All grant to welcome Katie Allaire as the Adapted Artistic Swimming Programs Project Manager. Katie's impact has already been felt, particularly with the success of the Adapted Team Ontario over the summer.



The structure of our standing and operational committees remained unchanged throughout this year. All committees continue to operate actively, as follows:

# RISK MANAGEMENT REPORT

Dear Members,

OAS has always been proactive in its governance practices and this year, we have taken significant strides in ensuring that our organization remains at the forefront of compliance and best practices in the sports sector.

#### **Governance Audit**

This year, OAS underwent a comprehensive audit facilitated by Canadian Artistic Swimming (CAS). The audit focused on four key areas of our operations, with the primary objective of assessing our compliance with the Canadian Sport Governance Code. The areas reviewed included:

- Governance and Policies (Manual of Operations MOP)
- Board of Directors (BOD)
- Financial Matters
- Various Sections (Incorporation, Insurance, Naming Conventions, Programs, Websites/Transparency)

It is noteworthy that while Provincial/Territorial Sport Organizations (PTSOs) are not currently mandated to comply with the Canadian Sport Governance Code, we anticipate future requirements and are committed to being proactive in our compliance efforts.

Based on this effort, the following key findings have been identified.

### **Governance & Policies (MOP)**

The audit of our Manual of Operations (MOP) revealed that our governance framework is robust and aligns with the best practices outlined in the Canadian Sport Governance Code. We have comprehensive policies in place that guide the operations and decisionmaking processes of OAS, ensuring transparency, accountability, and integrity.

### **Board of Directors (BOD)**

Our Board of Directors has demonstrated exemplary governance practices. The audit highlighted our adherence to the principles of effective board governance, including diverse representation, strategic oversight, and clear delineation of roles and responsibilities. The Board's commitment to continuous improvement and training was also noted as a strength.



### **Financial Matters**

The financial audit confirmed that OAS maintains high standards of financial management and reporting. Our financial practices are consistent with the requirements of the Canadian Sport Governance Code, ensuring the responsible stewardship of resources and financial transparency. We have established robust internal controls and regularly review our financial policies to align with evolving standards.

### **Various Sections**

- Incorporation: OAS is properly incorporated and complies with all legal requirements.
- Insurance: We have adequate insurance coverage that safeguards our organization, members, and activities.
- Naming Conventions: Our naming conventions are consistent and align with our branding and organizational identity.
- Programs: Our programs are well-structured, inclusive, and promote the development of artistic swimming in Ontario.
- Websites/Transparency: We maintain a transparent and informative online presence, providing easy access to essential information for our stakeholders.

The audit facilitated by CAS has been instrumental in affirming our commitment to governance excellence. I am proud to report that OAS is fully compliant with the requirements set forth in the Canadian Sport Governance Code. This achievement is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our Board, staff, and volunteers.





### Safe Sport & SupportZone

The launch of SupportZone highlights OAS's commitment to being at the forefront of creating positive change within the sporting community. This innovative program was designed to tackle the diverse challenges our members face, ensuring that everyone—from athletes to coaches and parents—has access to a neutral, confidential space. Here, members can voice concerns, seek guidance, and navigate complex interpersonal issues with the support of professional leadership coaches.

The program has already demonstrated its effectiveness through a series of confidential consultations that have helped individuals resolve conflicts, explore their feelings, and plan constructive next steps. These interactions, documented in monthly reports, underline the importance of having such a resource available to our community.

### **Conclusion**

Moving forward, we will continue to uphold these high standards and remain vigilant in our efforts to enhance our governance practices and provide a safe and inclusive environment to our members. Our proactive approach ensures that we are well-prepared for any future compliance requirements and positions us as a leader in the artistic swimming community.

# HIGH PERFORMANCE REPORT

The OAS team is very proud to highlight the many achievements of Ontario athletes and coaches in the 2023-24 season.

### **Provincial Programming**

The 2023 Provincial Team program included 4 teams that represented Ontario extremely well: the Youth Performance Team, the Youth Development Team, the 12U Performance Team and the 12U Development Team.

These teams competed against other provinces at the 2023 SYNC Competition, hosted by OAS at the Markham Pan Am Center in July 2023. This was the first SYNC operated under the new World Aquatics scoring system. Team Ontario had some outstanding results, and earned the opportunity to represent Canada in female solo, male solo and mixed duet at the 2023 Youth World Championships, and in youth team, 12U team, 12U duet and 12U solo at the 2023 Pan Am Artistic Swimming Championships. These competitions were held in Athens, Greece and Fort Lauderdale, Florida respectively.

Ontario's athletes shone once again at the Pan Am Championships, bringing home a gold medal in youth duet, silver medals in 12U solo, 12U duet, youth mixed duet and youth team, and bronze medals in 12U solo, 12U team, youth male solo and 12U team. At Youth Worlds, Team Ontario athletes finished 5th in male solo, 6th in mixed duet, and 10th in female solo. In addition to a very successful Provincial Team program, six Ontario athletes and one coach also qualified to represent Canada on the 2023 Junior National Team. Congratulations to Nadia Crits, Evelyn Goddard, Karen Gu, Lauren Irvine, Larissa Loucks, Alyssa You and coach Yingli Hou!

### **OHPSI Funding**

The 2023-24 season also marked the first fiscal year following OAS' successful application to the Tier 2 level of OHPSI funding. With the increase in funding, we were able to implement the following:

• The addition of Yingli Hou to our staff in the role of High Performance Provincial Coach. In this role Yingli designed and implemented the 23-24 HP Academy Program to support identified athletes and their coaches within their daily training environments and in centralized camps. Yingli also developed the strategy for the 2025 Canada Games Team selection and preparation as well as identifying areas of priority for the technical development of our Ontario athletes. She will be leading our 2025 Canada Games team alongside Team Manager and Assistant Coach Courtney Durand.



- Reduction of the program fee for the HP Academy Program by 25%. OAS is committed to continuing to address barriers to participation in our programming without compromising program quality. Athletes in the 2023-24 HP Academy continued to have access to top experts and CSIO practitioners for a lower fee.
- Increased outreach of support into the daily training environments of HP Academy program athletes. In addition to regional CSIO support, Yingli performed club visits to work with HP Academy athletes and their coaches in a tailored approach to promote athlete success. Athletes and coaches were also able to maintain communication with Yingli and receive regular feedback outside of Academy pool sessions.

### **HP Academy Program**

Fifty-five Youth and Junior athletes selected from across the province participated in the 2023-24 HP Academy. In addition to the outreach activities outlined above, athletes took part in 2 centralized camps and 1 regional camp. The kick-off October camp was held at Toronto Pan Am Sports Center over 2 days.

Athletes worked with Team Ontario coaches and other expert consultants on technical drills, testing, acro, artistic impression, flexibility, nutrition and mental performance. In November, athletes once again gathered for a weekend camp at TPASC where they worked with Ontario coaches, Canada Artistic Swimming staff and National Team athletes. Stations focused on technical skill development, with some work on core strength, drama and water flexibility.

In December, athletes attended a small camp in their region where they worked with Yingli Hou and Ontario judges and were evaluated on figures, technical required elements and free hybrid execution. Their coaches also received feedback on maximizing hybrid difficulty in advance of the 2024 competition season.

# ADAPTED COMMITTEE REPORT

The Ontario Adapted Artistic Swimming Committee continued to meet regularly over the 2023-2024 season to provide ongoing support and direction for the Adapted artistic swimming category. The OAdASC plays a vital leadership role in Ontario and across the country to advocate for equity and inclusion for participants of all abilities in our sport. The OAdASC made significant contributions at both the provincial and national level this season. Two main areas of impact were:

### **New World Aquatics Scoring System Implementation**

Much work was done to support and navigate the implementation of the new World Aquatics scoring system to the Adapted and Mixed Ability categories. The OAdASC provided strategic direction for the implementation of the new system as well as developed several new resources:

- Adapted Routine Elements Table
- The Adapted Difficulty Table
- · Adapted Technical Required Elements
- Mixed Ability Routine Elements Table

These resources were adopted by Canada Artistic Swimming for use in the Adapted category at National competitions. The OAdASC embraced the challenge of implementing the new system for the Adapted category and ensured that our athletes were provided with meaningful competition opportunities that rewarded their achievements.

## **Strategic Priority Identification**

The OAdASC worked to identify strategic priorities to address key issues affecting Adapted programming at the club and Provincial level. The OAdASC recognized three areas that would benefit from more support and input from members of the Adapted artistic swimming community outside of the committee. A call for applications was made to join the following task forces:

- Athlete Recruitment and Club Marketing Support
- Adapted Athlete Classification
- Club Program Support and Coach Education



These task forces will be working over the upcoming season to address gaps in these identified areas and develop resources and infrastructure in support of clubs, coaches and athletes.



# COMPETITIONS, RULES & TECHNICAL COMMITTEE

The Ontario Competitions, Rules and Technical Committee provides technical recommendations and direction for rules and competition structure at the provincial level. The committee faced a significant challenge for the 2023-24 season: adapting the new World Aquatics scoring system to the developmental competitive levels.

The committee rose to the challenge and embraced creative solutions that balanced alignment with World Aquatics and Canada Artistic Swimming with the promotion of success and achievement for our younger and less experienced athletes. Following the OCRTC's guidance, all competitive stream age group events in Ontario were held under the new scoring system for the first time ever.

Under the new AQUA system, athletes received objectively calculated degrees of difficulty of their routines, as well as separate execution scores for each element of their routines. Artistic scores were composed of separate scores for different components of artistic impression. The goal of the new system is to reward athletes for the content of their routines, as well as provide more focused scoring for each component. As this system evolves, the OCRTC will continue to evaluate the implementation at provincial events.



The OCRTC strives to ensure that Ontario events are athlete-centered. In that vein, and to provide more opportunities for the recognition of athletes' success, Ontario competitions in 2024 had separate awards for the Provincial and National competitive streams. Furthermore, routines were streamed from the beginning of the season, ensuring that routines had an appropriate level of competition to test and develop athlete skills. Our flagship event, Ontario Open Championships, celebrated the achievements of our Provincial stream athletes.

The OCRTC would like to thank all stakeholders for their contribution to the success of the Ontario events under the new system, as well as the input received via rule change requests. The committee is excited to continue updating and improving the provincial implementation of the AQUA rules, providing athlete-centered competition opportunities for all ages, as well as pursuing creative solutions to manage the burgeoning number of entries in our competitive events.

# ONTARIO OFFICIALS COMMITTEE REPORT



### 2023-2024 Competitive Season
